

Looking for a treatment option for your itchy dog?



Is your dog scratching? Does your dog keep you up at night with sounds of chewing and licking? These could be signs of skin allergies (allergic dermatitis) in dogs. **Answer the questions below and share your responses with your veterinarian.** Together you can find the cause of the itch and treatment options that work—for your dog, and for you.

Possible signs of skin allergies in dogs:

- My dog frequently scratches, licks, chews, bites, rubs at his/her skin, and/or scoots Y N
- My dog has hair loss, body odor, itchiness, or skin changes: rash, redness, greasy skin, or scabs Y N
- My dog has experienced recurrent ear problems (ear irritation or ear infections) and/or skin infections Y N

Impact on quality of life:

- My dog isn't as happy or content due to all the scratching Y N S
- My dog's overall enjoyment and participation in activities and social interactions is diminished Y N S
- Sleep has been an issue for my dog and that has affected our lives as well Y N S
- The current treatment for my dog's skin disease has side effects or the treatment schedule is disruptive to our relationship Y N S

Treatment preferences:

- My dog does not enjoy taking pills, even in food or treats Y N
- I cannot apply topical treatments to my dog as frequently as instructed (e.g., inconvenient, messy) Y N
- Remembering to give medication to my dog on a daily basis and long-term is challenging Y N
